Praise God, that despite all circumstances, we were able to hold a children's camp this year. Of course, the conditions this year were a bit restricted. Nobody was allowed to come to camp without a mask, and at the gate everyone got their temperature taken and had to wash their hands with antiseptic. In addition, the length of the camp was somewhat shortened.

Nevertheless, parents calmly allowed their kids to attend. This year, lunch was also in an untypical format. In order to carry out all the requirements of the quarantine, the food was served in lunch bags: sandwiches in separate packets, juices, water only from separate bottles, cookies in packets, and many other tasty treats. Apparently, eating lunch in this way didn't bother the kids.

In all, we had more than 100 children, including the preschool group. All of the lessons were seld outside, except for music. And at the music

On the day after we gave each child a copy of "The Bible in Childhood" (the New Testament with illustrations), the following conversation took place. Then he turned to a slightly younger boy and asked, "What page are you on?" After pausing to think, the other boy answered, "I'm only on page 35." Then that boy, as if to justify himself, added, "But that's only





because I wasn't able to sit down and read until late in the evening.

Both the children and the teens were very interested in this book. They commented that it's very easy to read and to understand. We explained that this isn't simply a gift that appeared out of nowhere, but that these were paid for by people who want children to read them and appreciate them. Children expressed their thanks many times.

We also had a water day as "something new" this year. We decided to use washable colored powders, which the kids (and the leaders) really enjoyed. In addition to the good cheer they sparked, they also resulted in fun, bright photographs, which many kids posted on their social media, saying these were photos "from camp," which was very cool.





On the final day of camp, the campers and leaders said goodbye to one another with great sadness, saying, "It will be too hard to wait a whole year." Nobody wanted to leave. After all, camp is a blessed time.
