In these days, our country celebrates Easter, and our First Baptist Church of Bilogorodka likewise conducts holiday services. One of these services was the "Children's Easter Service," which in this year, due to quarantine restrictions, was divided into two—one for younger children and one for older children. Unfortunately, due to the coronavirus, for a long time we had not held any holiday services for children in our local church so we had concerns: "Will children come? How many will there be?" In the end, as a sign of God's love, each child received a gift along with an invitation to come to Sunday school or to teen fellowship, which are held in our church building for them. After the services, we heard many expressions of appreciation from parents and those who attended.

We, in turn, thank God for this labor that was accomplished, and we want to continue praying for the results, which He is powerful to work in each heart that was present at these services!

Because of this, we decided that in the future, if the Lord permits, we will make announcements and pass out invitations earlier. Even though there have been days when children came in during worship services and inquired of church members whether there would be a camp that day.

Great praise and thanks be to the Lord for the fact that, with your assistance and support, we can do this ministry on this side of town. And we ask that you pray that everything will go smoothly in this camp for God's glory. This is a much-needed labor on God's harvest fields.
