3rd Quarter Report, 2021

August

This month our puppet theater visited Sukharevka. This is a small settlement on the border of the 30-kilometer Chernobyl Zone. We call these places "endangered settlements," because young people, as a rule, leave them. Only old people and those who for some reason could not leave and begin new lives elsewhere remain in them. But surprisingly, there are children there, and they need attention like nowhere else. In such towns, people drink a lot out of despair. If there is work, then the job pays very poorly. So, families have to survive in such conditions.



Children in such families are often not well-groomed. They are deficient in attention. So, they busy themselves with themselves. The mayor of this town always invites us to come and somehow minister to these children. When we have the opportunity, we are happy to go to Sukharevka and similar settlements. Children here are very grateful, because they are rarely pampered with luxuries like children's activities. But whenever



there's something fun to do, their attendance is 100%. These children will definitely not miss an opportunity to have fun. There aren't many of them, but these are the most grateful children's hearts. Of course, we cannot visit such children without gifts. We bring them not only a puppet show to watch but also various things they need, such as stationery and toys. Of course, we bring various sweets, too.

Dear friends, we very much ask you to pray for these children and for their parents, who often get drunk. Pray that the Lord would visit such families and they will trust Christ be freed of these bad habits.

We are very grateful to you for your prayers, your financial support, and your love for us. Thanks to you, the work of God is being accomplished here in Ukraine. God bless you!
