Evangelism as never before

In the western Ukrainian city of Lviv, BIEM missionary Yura Levtseniuk says, "We understand God is opening a new door of evangelism. People coming here have fled for their lives. They left everything behind just to save their lives. So, when we have our meetings in the evening and pray for peace in Ukraine, we share the Gospel with them. They say, 'We've never heard this. We've never read the Bible.' I've been shocked, but I can see God's hand in this. We need to preach the Gospel to them.... God is doing something amazing in the hearts of these people. They weep as they receive the Word. They say they have found peace in it...."

In the city of Dubno, Pastor Igor Levtseniuk is even more vocal in declaring the war has given his church unprecedented opportunities to win souls, especially among refugees.

Pastor Igor says, "War is negative. It brings tears. It brings sorrow. We talk so much about war, about how the Devil is in it and what grief and horror war brings. People are so weary of it. But we turned our attention to what God is accomplishing during the war. What we've seen is that our all-powerful, wonderful God is using something negative to bring about blessing. So, we see a lot of positive things as well. I look out at our congregation on Sundays, and I see a completely new congregation. There are people from all over Ukraine, people who came from very troubled, wartorn regions. Many of them are lost, and continued on page 3

S.O.S. for Summer Camps!

Earlier in 2022, we in the BIEM home office had assumed summer camps could not be held in Ukraine this summer. However, even though we can't hold camps in regions under Russian occupation, our Ukrainian personnel insist camps are possible and *needed*.

Due to the war, young people in Ukraine have been terrorized. Reality has often forced youths and even young kids to see brutal sights. They need opportunities to play, to sing, and simply to laugh again. More vital, they need to hear the Gospel and understand God's way of salvation. The uplifting atmosphere in Christian camps will provide an ideal setting to answer questions concerning life after death and for God to touch young hearts.

In the past, our annual goal for camps has been \$40,000. However, prices have increased dramatically due to the war and shortages. This year we hope to raise \$50,000. Of that, we already have \$21,400 on hand, leaving \$28,600 still needed. Can you help us to hold camps for kids and youth, not only in Ukraine but also in other countries of Eastern Europe? they're hearing the Word of God for the first time. Isn't this a miracle from God?

"One time I took the microphone and interviewed people right in the auditorium. I asked, "Can you name anything good that has come out of the war?" Many people answered, if not for the war, they never would have heard the Gospel or accepted Christ as Savior. But now they are born again—new people. Our church has been revitalized. Our church has changed! So, we're pouring our lives into serving these people. It's a very strategic ministry."

Ministering to needs in God's name

In central Ukraine, one BIEM missionary-pastor led his church in buying and cooking food for Ukrainian soldiers encamped not far away. They delivered these meals as gifts given in Jesus' name. What an impact this simple act of service had. The church's reputation soared! Then, in an unexpected twist, Ukraine's military even bestowed special medals ("For selfless service to the homeland") on our BIEM missionary and on the two church members who helped him to deliver food to hungry soldiers.

Another side effect of ministering in the name of the Lord is the impact that service has had on believers. For instance, men who had been enrolled in the drug and alcohol rehabilitation program in Desna agreed to help distribute humanitarian aid provided by BIEM. By assisting needy ones, these men found new purpose in life. Instead languishing as victims of addiction, they've been transformed. Becoming good Samaritans in a time of national need has boosted their morale and developed their character. They rejoice to feel God using them to make a positive impact on their countrymen, all to the glory of the Lord.

Similarly, church members all over Ukraine are stepping up to the plate and ministering to others' physical and spiritual needs in a variety of ways.

So, no, God is not limited. Even in time of war we can find reasons to thank God and sing His praises!
